R. Couture Sea Cadet of the Year Award was presented to CPO Samuel Rodriguez, NSCC. The award reads: "CPO Rodriguez is an outstanding leader in the Ouellet Division. With a near-perfect attendance record for the past five years, his work ethic, concentration and ambition earned him promotions up to becoming the very first Chief Petty Officer the Division has had for many years. He readily assumes command and is adept at mentoring new Cadets and instructing them in the many Sea Cadet requirements."

This Award is named in honor of RADM Raymond R. Couture, USN(Ret) who provided outstanding support for the Naval Sea Cadet Corps over many years while a National Navy League Vice President and as a President and Director of the Massachusetts Bay Council.

LTJG Michael Mulcahey, NSCC, "who consistently
demonstrated outstanding leadership skills which motivated

This Award is named in honor of LCDR Richard Pollis, NSCC, who worked with the Naval Sea Cadets for forty years and commanded Squadron Seven Zulu for many of them. He led an outstanding unit and was instrumental in establishing ties to the Canadian Sea Cadets and escorting the unit several times to Canada.

For thirty-one years Sea Cadet Regions have held a Flagship Competition Event, the purpose of which is to encourage the acquisition of Sea Cadet skills and knowledge by providing cadets with an opportunity for their efforts to be recognized in a friendly, yet competitive manner, to increase unit cohesion through team play, to provide both cadets and officers with an opportunity to build relationships and develop camaraderie and to increase the exposure of the Sea Cadet program within the community.

This three-day event includes competition between units in the Region in events such as MORSE CODE, SEMAPHORE SIGNALLING, HEAVING LINE, FIREFIGHTING, FIRST AID SKILLS, AND MARKSMANSHIP, KNOT TYING AND SIGNAL FLAG RECOGNITION.



Plaque on Boston Common

John Barry has been credited as being "The Father of the American Navy". The plaque text reads:

"Father of the American Navy
Commodore John Barry Born in Wexford Ireland 1745.
Died in Philadelphia 1803. Received First Commission
From the Continental Congress To Command the
Lexington 1775. Sailed from Boston on the Raleigh
1778. Acclaimed in Boston in 1780 For Victories on the
Alliance. Appointed in 1794 By President Washington
To Plan the Construction of And Later to be in
Command Of First U.S. Navy Launched 1798 Erected by
the City of Boston James M Curley Mayor 1949
Tablet restored by the George B. Henderson
Foundation, 1976"

The Jones Act

Members were asked to write their congressman and the national email Rapid Response Campaign received massive support from advocates like you! A big victory for Navy League advocates as we helped defeat a proposed amendment that would have weakened the Jones Act. The proposed amendment to the Coast Guard Authorization Act would have created a waiver program allowing foreign vessels to usurp the operations of American vessels.
