Sea Cadets March in Boston St. Patrick's Day Parade 2019

*Boston, MA* - It was a cold and sunny day for the people of Boston as a million or so spectators crowded the streets to celebrate the annual St. Patrick's Day parade. Hours before the parade started, the Sea Cadets of New England Region 1-1, *Constitution Division, Massachusetts Bay Division*, and *Squadron 7-Zulu*, prepared their color guard teams and cadets for the long, 3.2 mile route, the longest parade route in Massachusetts. The parade began and the streets of South Boston roared with enthusiasm as various groups marched on. The cadets demonstrated mental toughness in the cold and windy weather and maintained their military discipline as some of the parade goers heckled them. Many people commented that the cadets' discipline was equivalent or surpassed that of an active duty military unit. When organizing the regional divisions before the parade, it was discovered that about one half of the cadets have neither attended Recruit Training nor League Cadet Orientation. With just minutes of practice before the start of the parade, the cadets worked together to instruct the junior cadets how to march, at the very least, to stay in step with cadence. Due to the leadership and teamwork, many people took notice and commented on the cadets' military bearing and professionalism. Throughout the two and a half hour parade, the cadets displayed that the U.S. Naval Sea Cadet Corps is comprised of disciplined, dedicated, and motivated young men and women. The highest rank bestowed by the Corps, "Chief Petty Officer", is synonymous with "Eagle" in the Boy Scout program. Noons is a Senior at Marshfield High School. He is a lifeguard for the YMCA, and an accomplished varsity swimmer, Daniel has been an award-winning member of the Gosnold Division's Swim Team as well as the Silent Drill Team, and served as a Squad Leader before his appointment as the Leading Cadet.

Daniel began his cadet career in the Corps at the age of 11 and has progressed to Chief Petty Officer after completing recruit training "boot camp" at Ft. Devens in Ayer, Mass., as well as training with the Coast Guard in Woods Hole; "Leadership Academy" at Mass. Maritime Academy; Field Operations in Plymouth; Military Police Training in Newport, R.I.; and underway at sea aboard the USS WHIDBEY ISLAND, a Navy transport ship.

Noons is also accomplished in the martial arts, practicing Tai Kwon Do for four years, as well as boxing for a year. An accomplished singer and guitar player, he is a member of the high school choral group "Marshalairs."
